Poll: 29% of Boyfriends Unaware of Relationship

WASHINGTON, DC—According to a recent poll by the Gallup Organization, 29% of American boyfriends are completely unaware that they are in a relationship with the women they see on a regular basis.

The poll, which has been the cause

of heated debate among both nonboyfriends and sort-of-but-not-really boyfriends, reports that nearly a third of men, when asked about the girl they see at least three times a week, denied being in a committed relationship.

"Nah, she's not my girlfriend." said Rob Hamils, a UNC graduate who has reportedly not been dating fellow graduate, Sarah Mallow, for the past eight months. "We're not like, dating or anything. It's just that we like to hang out every day of the week. No big deal."

"Also, sex," added Hamils. "We have sex frequently. But it's nothing, really."

Experts have been baffled to find such a large number of men had been frequently seeing the same women without classifying their relationship as "dating." The Gallup Organization, which conducted the poll over the course of a year amongst several state schools, reports 19% of men responded with "Wait, what?" while 37% chose "Define girlfriend..." Among those polled, 8% refused to answer and 14% immediately ran away.

"The most difficult part of the study was the initial investigation," explained Gallup statistician Candice Melton. "A large percentage of respondents simply stuffed their hands in their pockets and whistled innocently. We also found that questioning the subject within three feet of his girlfriend produced optimal results."

Since the study was released, thousands of boyfriends have objected to the investigation, citing leading or deceptive questioning to explain the results. Ole Miss Sophomore Teddy Akers addressed the media Friday: "These

The poll left Akers' girlfriend Brittany Sharp unmoved. "People can talk all they want, but every time Teddy lets a door swing shut on my face, I know he's really saying 'You're my everything," said Sharp as her reported boyfriend Akers sped away in his Camaro. "He loves me, I know he does."

While many women across the country have taken this news in stride, others have reacted with disdain. According to investigators, Kari Tillinghast, an Iowa State senior and girlfriend of Byron Hawkins, elected to make no mention of the study and act as if nothing was wrong only to later hurl Hawkins' X-Box at him while he was sleeping. There have been numerous reports of girlfriends employing other methods to show their frustration including, but not limited to withholding sex, the silent treatment, and keying "You're a pussy-shit asshole" into their boyfriend's car door.

The poll also revealed that 51% of men are painfully aware of their role as boyfriends, and 12% are just rebounds.


Many of Kanu's most popular segments involve food preparation, as most African families subsist off meager rations and are always looking for new ways to spice up their meals.

ANAHEIM— The guy who spends a large amount of time hanging out at Kohl's has been determined to be Luis Gonzalez, a 19-year-old employee who has worked at the department store for three years. Gonzalez has been seen walking around aimlessly inside the Kohl's at Ventura Boulevard for months, and customers have largely assumed him to be just another person shopping inside the store.

"Wait, that guy right there works for me? I thought Gonzalez died a few years back from leukemia or something," explained shift manager David Chan. "This store is so big; how I am supposed to know that some guy playing solitaire in the men's department should be folding shirts right now?"


Super Wal-Mart drives regular Wal-Mart out of business

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Texas Travesty **Interview**

John Krasinski, A.K.A. Jim from NBC's "The Office" seems to have the whole package: actor, director, and writer. Krasinski, whose career exploded with NBC's 2005 launch of "The Office," has made his directorial debut with "Brief Interviews with Hideous Men," a film adaptation of David Foster Wallace's provocative and awesomely bizarre collection of short stories. The Travesty got a chance to speak with John about his experience on the film set, and, of course, his most favored flirtatious moments with Pam Beesley.

Texas Travesty: This is your directorial debut. Was it fun having that kind of creative control over a project, or would you rather just go back to acting?

John Krasinski: I think acting is sort of it for me. But this one was sort of a perfect experience, in a way. I never wanted to be a director, so doing this was something I did because I felt really inspired by the material. I had read [the book] in college and did a stage reading of it and was so moved and blown away that I just wanted to do something with it ever since I left college. I finally got the rights, wrote the script and ended up directing it. Really, after we were searching for a director, just one day, believe it or not, Rainn Wilson and said "Why don't you just direct it?" I was like, "I can't do that! Wait a minute..." So I jumped up to the plate and did it, and it was just phenomenal. I don't even know if I would direct again, not because I didn't have a great time but because this one was pretty perfect. To be surrounded by a crew and a cast like that is a very rare occasion. I had a really good time directing this, but I think I would be hard pressed to find material that would inspire me in the same way to do all that work for a movie like that again.

TT: I read this book about a year ago and I was really excited when I heard you were making a movie about it. Being both writer and director, you had control of the

adaptation by one of the greatest authors in the last decades. Was it stressful to make decisions about how you were going to portray this work in film, or was it pretty easy to just adapt it?

JK: It was actually really terrifying from the adaptation side of it. First and foremost, I'm a huge David Foster Wallace fan, so to be doing the adaptation of a book that I think a lot of people love, written by an author that a lot of people love; it's a really scary prospect. You're taking something that is beloved on so many big, deep levels. The hardest part for me in adapting it was editing the book. To just cut out huge chunks of text was sort of terrifying, because I kept thinking to myself, "what right do I have to think these three pages aren't good enough to make it into my movie?" So that was the hardest part: editing down the monologues to a place where actors could actually get their hands around them and really work through them, because some of the dialogue is a bit overly literary and, in that way, really, really great for the book. But for actors to speak it, you need to cut it down and pare it down a little bit. That was the toughest part.

TT: Along those lines, did you do very many alterations to the story? Or did you pretty much just copy the book into the script?

JK: The interviews were definitely taken right from the book and put

into the script. As far as throughline and things like that, I just basically had to invent the world that all these guys lived in, and create the character of Sarah, who is the woman that is interviewing them the whole time. That was really fun. I think for me, for some reason, it was always really vivid in my head that this was a woman that was interviewing these guys. Then, when the guys answer her questions in the book, their responses to her always seemed like they had been challenged in some way, that this isn't just a clinical series of questions, but that this is actually sort of delving into something that these guys are finding very difficult to talk about. I thought that was really interesting and that's where I got the idea that she's on some sort of personal quest as well as this academic pursuit. That was the big thing there, creating that character was actually extremely

TT: The interviewer doesn't have a voice in the book. So, did your mind go directly to this character that you created? Or did you have some other ideas for how you were going to link these stories together?

JK: At first I was going to set it in space and it was going to be an action thriller...no. [Laughter] It's a difficult thing, because when you direct a movie and it's definitely your first one, the fact that you come out of the gates and you say, "I want it to be nonlinear and I want it to be sort of a crazy

experience, similar to the one you had when you were reading the book," it's sort of a wild concept. I was super psyched about it, because, like I said, I wasn't planning on having this be some huge epic film in the directing world, so I wanted to solely do the book justice. So, throughout the whole process, I really tried maintaining that sort of feeling of the experience. I had written a couple of different versions of the arch of Sarah and in one I sort of made the breakup a little more problematic and made the whole thing sort of linear and cinematic, but the truth is the material itself won't hold onto that sort of a fabricated structure, because it basically wants to be a series of interviews with guys and have you basically experiencing one sort of guy after another and putting them all together at the end. It was kind of amazing at the end of it that the more I tried to put a linear structure to the movie, the more it didn't work. It felt like it was falling flat.

TT: So, this movie is billed as a comedy, and while David Foster Wallace's writing is hilarious, there's a lot of weight to it. When you went into it did you have a strictly comedic mindset?

JK: No, I don't know why it's been billed as a comedy. I mean, I think I appreciate it because there's something ironic about that whole thing and there are many funny moments in it, but at the end of the day, I think that it's an experience. I'm sure I sound incredibly pretentious saying it's a "film experience." One of the two main reasons that I ever wanted to do this were to have more people experience what I experienced the first time I read the book in college, and sort of this mind-altering thing I thought the way these guys were speaking so honestly with a very unique perspective on the world. I just wanted more people to know about David Foster Wallace. If I could bring one of his books to a bigger medium and get more people interested, maybe he would have more readers, which would be exciting.

Then the other thing is, literally, the only thing I want from this movie, with people walking out, is that they have a conversation. Usually, the biggest thing to me is that even if you didn't like a movie, which is totally acceptable and fine with me, I would hope that you would take

the material in and you would actually let it sit with you for a second and then not be sure what you thought of the movie for a few minutes. That's kind of an amazing compliment, and that's definitely the way I felt when I read the book. So, if you say, "I don't know. I thought maybe this was a little uncomfortable, and that part I thought was funny, and this part was offensive," and this and that. Hopefully, you would find somebody willing to talk it out with you. Hopefully it's one of those things that at the end of it you kind of have to stop and think about your life for a second.

TT: There were a lot of really great actors in this film. As a director, when you're setting up a scene, do you kind of let them develop the characters themselves or do you give them a lot of guidance for what you envision the characters to be?

JK: Well, you know, it's funny. I was really interested to see what their take was on it in the beginning. The truth is that the material is kind of an actor's dream, that you have a three-part arch all in a few pages. All the actors completely identified that immediately, and so they had an idea of who these people were and they were really excited to give it a shot. Then I basically set them on the path and said, "These are my thoughts on the guy," and just basic things like, "This is where I think this guy goes after work," and they would take that scene and sort of do their own thing with it, which I really loved. If people kind of got off the path I would bring them back, but the big conversations happened right off the bat before we started filming. I would go to lunch with all the actors and talk about where they were coming from, and it was pretty right on. Most of the guys knew exactly what they wanted to do. There were a couple of times when I wanted to push the envelope a little bit and make it a little bit funnier than it seemed on the page, because I think that's very interesting when people are talking about very serious stuff in a comedic way. Then, with people like Dominic Cooper, we pushed it all the way. We tried to get him as fired up as he could possibly be. That was an incredible scene to shoot.

Texas Travesty Interview

Mike Birbiglia

If you ever see Mike Birbiglia walking down the street, you should go shake him, because he's probably sleep-walking. Despite struggles with his sleep disorder, Birbiglia has quickly emerged as one of the funniest and most inspired comedians in recent years. After making a breakthrough appearance on the Late Show with David Letterman at age 24, Birbiglia wrote and produced an off-Broadway comedy show called "Sleepwalk with Me." Most recently, he's been working on a new book and touring across the country with Comedy Central Live. The Travesty recently spoke with Mike about success, parents, and how a unique life provides the best inspiration.



Texas Travesty: What would you consider to be your first big break into the world of comedy? Mike Birbiglia: There's been so many along the way. You think there's going to be one big break, and then that one will happen, and you're like, "Well, I'm still poor," so I think I need some more breaks. Then you get another break, and you still need more. Probably the most memorable thing that I've ever done is doing Letterman when I was 24, because I really idolized Letterman my whole life, and to be on his show and to have him like my set was pretty mind-blowing for me.

TT: I read that you were voted "Funniest Person on Campus" at Georgetown University when you went to school there.

MB: Yeah, it was a contest, so that was actually the first time I ever did stand-up. I entered this contest and I won, so maybe it was just beginner's luck. In fairness, it was not a hilarious school, but there's some good people there. I worked with Nick Kroll, and he's a very funny comedian and actor. He's in that new show "The League".

TT: So you didn't count anything as a major success until you did Letterman after finishing school?

MB: Yeah, that was the point where it legitimized me to my

parents, which I think is more important than anything, or at least it seems that way. It feels like you have to legitimize your existence when you explain yourself to your parents, and that was the point in which they stopped telling me not to be a comedian.

TT: Were your parents supportive of you making this career move, or were they more like, "No, you should go to law school"?

MB: Yeah, there was a lot of that. Certainly when I was in college there was a lot of that and also when I got out of college, for the first couple of years. My dad would say semisupportive things like, "This comedy thing might parlay nicely into advertising," and I told him, "No, this is it. This is the plan." Yeah, it's kind of hard. My dad's a doctor, and he didn't send his kid to college for four years to get a job making fun of him in front of strangers; that was not in the

TT: Living in New York City, do you feel like a lot of your material comes from the city?

MB: I definitely think there is a pace to New York City that's really fast, and I think it leads to a lot of productivity and a lot of writing. When I'm in California, for example, I never get any writing done. There are so many people, and that's part

of it, and there are so many different types of people living in a small space. New York is good for comedy, overall.

disorders tend to not talk about it much and keep it quiet. You, on the other hand, turned your particular situation (REM behavior disorder) into a big time production. What inspired you to go in this direction?

MB: It kind of evolved into that. It started off as this one-man play that I was writing about a guy and a girl who had been dating since college, and the guy mentions that he wants to break up, but he didn't want to deal with it or confront it. The metaphor that ran through the play was that the character was sleepwalking, and it would kind of represent this sort of anxiety. And while I was writing this play, I had this incident where I jumped out of a second-story window in my sleep, from my own personal sleepwalking, and my director Seth Parrish told me, "I think that's your play. I think that's how you need to structure it." So that's what the play became about; the idea that you can avoid something for so long that it can kill you.

TT: It's interesting to see how that idea evolved. I know that the play has seen a lot of critical success.

fortunate for that. We were nervous to see what the critics would say, because you kind of live and die by the critics in New York, and luckily they were very positive. It was a great experience. What was great about it was the fact that it allowed me to stay in New York for eight months straight. I usually tour about 100 cities and towns a year, and for an eight-month span I was able to be in one city. It was good for my relationships and good for my personal life.

TT: *I* noticed that you poke fun at your brother Joe in some of your shows. Does he ever try to come up with ways to get back at you? MB: I don't think so...maybe in really subtle ways. Now I'm getting paranoid. No, Joe has always been extremely supportive and I make jokes about him, but we're really close and he collaborates on a lot of writing with me. He's a really great comedic writer; he's the funny guy in the family. TT: Most people who have He's always the class clown of the family. I write my 'Secret Public Journal' blog and I'll email it to him, and then he'll send me back some ideas and edits. Then I'll take half of them and do a new version, and send it back to him, and so forth. That's how I write my journals every week.

> TT: You're performing this Saturday at the Paramount Theatre here in Austin. Do you ever write jokes specific to the place s you visit?

MB: Not really. I always try to make my material as human as possible, so I don't really have to adjust it that much. But I also try to improvise a little bit every show depending on what's going on or where I am. I always like visiting Austin— I've been there probably four or five times over the years. I performed at SXSW at Emo's. Eugene Mirman and I did a show there once. I always have a great time there. I find the people to be really smart there, and it's always fun to visit.

TT: The Austin show is the last stop on your latest tour. What do you do usually when you're off tour to kick back and relax in vour free time?

MB: Well, I don't have a ton of

MB: Yeah, and we're very free time. I play a little bit of tennis, and I went to this adult tennis camp thing this summer. I play guitar a little bit as well, but I spend quite a lot of time writing. I see it as a privilege to be able to write. I'm working on a screenplay adaptation of "Sleepwalk with Me" and also a book with Simon and Schuster called "Sleepwalk with Me and Other Stories". I'm kind of up to my neck in writing assignments right now.

TT: So no rest for the weary?


MB: Yeah, exactly. I feel like when you do what you love, you have to do it much more than what is comfortable, in order to keep up with everyone else who is doing what they

TT: What's going to be in your latest book? Autobiographical stories?

Yeah, autobiographical stories. The centerpiece of it will probably be some stories from the show, but the majority of the stories will just be kind of awkward childhood stories, and things like that. It's been fun. I've actually had to force myself to sit down and think about it. I wake in the morning and go to Starbucks and I just say, "I'm going to spend the next four hours here and just type until I have nothing else in my brain." What's come out of it is a lot of stories that I say, "Wow, I forgot that even happened!" Overall, I end up finding stuff that I didn't know was there. Actually, some of the stories I discovered in the book process I'm telling on stage. I have this story about going to a carnival when I was a kid with this girl I had a huge crush on, and I described my experience going on the Scrambler with her and the digestive insanity that ensues from eating popcorn, peanuts, and cotton candy and then going on a ride called the Scrambler. That was just a story I found writing the book, and now it's one of my favorite stories in stand-up. The cool thing about coming back to Austin is coming back to town with a whole new show that people here haven't seen before...I have a whole new thing and I'm excited about it.






